


We call it the AppleTalk™Personal Network. It's as easy to hook together as an extension cord. And almost as cheap. Less than \$50* a desk, versus up to \$1,200 for a typical network system.

Since the number one product of business is still paper, we found a way to make every sheet count. A breakthrough in printed communications we call the Laser-Writer printer.

Simply put, it's a print shop inside a 16" x 18" box that produces publicationquality text and graphics. Which, according to a recent survey by Boston University, will make your reports, presentations and overheads 65.6% more persuasive.


For your information, we'll be introducing an Apple file server later this year. It'll let you electronically store, retrieve and E-mail all those files, reports and memos that keep sliding off the pile in your in-box.

We've also found a way for The Macintosh Office to share offices with IBM.

Right now, Macintoshes can talk to IBM mainframes in their own 3270 language. And IBM PC's can use our LaserWriter printer.

Later on, we'll have an AppleTalk card that slips into an IBM PC. It'll allow PC's to trade information with Macintoshes. Access our file server. And it'll serve as a gateway between the IBM PC network and our Apple Talk network.





The Macintosh Office looks even better on paper thanks to our LaserWriter printer It produces publication quality lext and graphics on everything from letterbead to transparencies to envelopes to labels.

Third party developers are also working on The Macintosh Office. Next month, they'll be offfering shared data devices that let your workgroup share information. And they're writing a whole new generation of business software to go along with the 350 programs Macintosh already runs. Including Microsoft* Word, ThinkTank 512 and the soon-to-be-released Jazz from Lotus.
